HIGH TECH DISINFECTANT TO BE USED TO DECONTAMINATE MAYFLOWER DOG PARK

Escondido city officials announced that L-3 Communications will disinfect Mayflower Dog Park at no cost on Wednesday, September 24 at 2:00 p.m. A high tech disinfectant called SteraMist will be used. It is anticipated that the park will reopen to the public on Saturday, September 27 after additional testing is done on September 25 and 26 to ensure the park has been thoroughly decontaminated.

SteraMist uses L-3 Communications patented BIT technology. The BIT process ensures that microorganisms (including spores) are rapidly destroyed in even the most hard-to-reach areas. The process applies cold plasma activation to hydrogen peroxide based aerosol until the required concentration is achieved, after which all residual vapors are removed. The SteraMist process leaves no residues nor damages equipment since the solution breaks down into oxygen and water vapors.
